MCHS Board Seeks Resolution of Museum's Space Problem

As MCHS Board members met inside a vacant new building on September 18, 1958, George Accord is quoted as saying "Let's get Arah Dean down here and see what she can do - maybe in 25 years we can have a museum." Arah Dean Finch became the museum's first curator and worked hard to find items to put on display in the museum. Due to the tireless efforts of the board members and curator, and generosity of county residents, Mercer County had a respectable museum in just 10 years.

Contributions of artifacts continued to come in and soon we needed more space. The machine shed was added in 1973 to house items such as farm tools, implements, and those things that do not need a tightly controlled climate for protection from damage. In 1997 a storeroom addition was completed to the main museum building. Just this past year, in 2012, a financial donation from a former resident paid for an added room within the machine shed, allowing better use of the space there. The museum continues to accept items donated by residents or descendants of earlier residents, ranging in size anywhere from a postcard to farm implement, and we are faced once again with shortage of space for display and storage of these historical artifacts.

A meeting was held by MCHS board members on November 1 to discuss possible solutions to the space problem. The board rejected the idea of simply refusing to accept more donated artifacts. As one board member asked, "Are we simply going to say that history ends here?" All agreed that such an approach would soon make our museum stale and unappealing, as we would not be able to build new displays of as yet unseen items from Mercer County's past. The board also rejected the idea of buying or renting space somewhere else as a museum annex, due to the costs involved, which would include staffing, operation and maintenance.

The only solutions appearing acceptable to the board involve expansion of our space at or adjacent to the present location. Just what type of expansion and how we can proceed to get it done will be pursued at further meetings. The major roadblock will be obtaining the funding for such an expansion. Past additions were

built after MCHS received generous donations to cover the costs of those additions.

The money MCHS presently has in certificates of deposit provides interest needed to help fund the annual operating expenses of the museum. That interest on savings plus membership dues and donations are what keep the museum open. Due to the recent recession, our returns on certificates of deposit have not been enough to completely cover our expenses when added to dues and donations.

Our savings are being reduced each year just to keep the museum open and board members feel further reduction of savings to pay for expansion would only result in more space in a closed museum. So, even though building additional space appears to be the best option to resolve our problem, financing construction remains an obstacle that board members will seek to address in the coming months of discussion as we gather more information on expansion costs. The MCHS board has voted to establish a "building and maintenance" account separate from our savings, to receive donations specifically marked for museum expansion.

That separate account will allow us to closely track progress towards our goal of building more space for the museum.

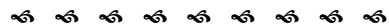
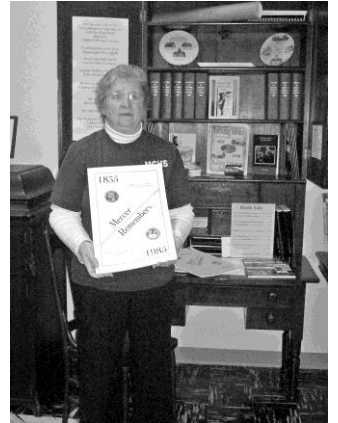
Compare the photo of the early museum display area and that of today, as well as the crowded condition of the machine shed today.



Mercer Remembers Available Again

To commemorate the 150th birthday of Mercer County in 1985, Patty Sackville compiled and edited a book entitled *Mercer Remembers: 1835-1985*.

The book was quite popular and quickly sold out. Since then, there have been countless requests from people still wanting one. As a result, Patty granted permission to the Mercer County Historical Society to have the book reprinted. New copies of the book are now available. Due to research by Patty and other authors (Mona Parsons, Evelyn Brown, and Cheryl McCaw, to name just a few), the book has information about each township in the county and contains photos and bits of history not reported in any of our other publications. The book sells for \$25 each and is available at the Essley-Noble Museum in Aledo during our winter hours and also at Wagner Pharmacy. It can be ordered from the museum and shipped by mail, but in that case, add \$8 for a mailer and postage, bringing the total to \$33. 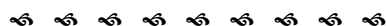

Photos Needed for Book

Board members Twyla Holmes and Stephanie Braucht are currently working on the historical society's next project, which is a pictorial history of Mercer County. They have signed a contract with Arcadia Publishing to create a book that will tell the history of the county and include between 180 and 240 pictures. Arcadia is the largest publisher of regional history books in the United States. Currently they publish over 6000 titles. The company's mission is to make local history available to everyone, reunite people with their past, and celebrate the faces and places that give America its spirit and its life. Twyla and Stephanie are in the process of identifying interesting photographs that will illustrate aspects of our county's past. There are many such photos in the museum's collection that can be used, but Twyla and Stephanie are putting out the call for any pictures you might allow them to scan and use. They need actual photographs, whether they were taken by a professional photographer or if they were snapshots taken with an individual's camera. A picture from a newspaper or some other publication will not meet the publisher's specifications. Twyla and Stephanie are looking for photos that show people, places, special events, and typical everyday activities from Mercer County's past. They will scan the photo into the museum's computer and you will keep the original. There will be a form for you to give written permission to use the picture for this one-time project and you retain the copyright of your picture. If anyone has any photographs you would like to share, please contact Twyla (309-582-5585) or Stephanie (309-584-4312). The book probably will be ready for sale in late summer or fall at the museum, at various historical society events, online at Arcadia's website, and hopefully at various retail locations around the county. Anticipated price will

be \$21.99. All proceeds from the book will go to the Mercer County Historical Society.

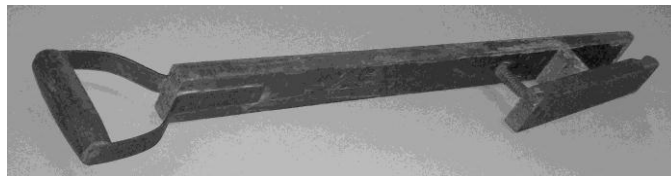
